Memorizing

Welcome to this awesome journey of knowing God more intimately by spending time memorizing His Word.

Memorizing is like putting together a puzzle. It's all about connecting the pieces until the complete picture emerges. A puzzle takes time and effort. So does memorizing. There will be challenges trying to fit all the pieces together but, by using a few tips, tricks and tools, You CAN Memorize!

The purpose of this study guide is to encourage you to memorize 'Mary's Song of Praise' by giving you tools to help you on your journey. You can choose to memorize the first sentence (written below) or all ten verses. Another option is learning to 'read' the first letter of each word as shown on page 6. Whichever goal you set for yourself, may these verses become a part of your worship, your prayer life, and your very being.

See the big picture

Seeing the big picture gives you a context for all the verses you are going to memorize.

Start by reading through the passage several times.

Who are the main characters? What do they do? How do they respond to life, to people, to God? Write out your observations.

Another way of understanding the passage is to take each phrase and turn it into a question. Ask Who? What? Where? When? Why? and How?

Now, cover the verses and recite the passage using the questions to prompt your memory.

Write out the passage using a mixture of pictures – drawings, doodles, abbreviations, symbols – and words.



Visualizing is one of the most effective tools for memorizing!



These verses are filled with drama. Act out the story. Use your whole being: facial expressions, actions, poses, pauses, and volume. Practice in front of a mirror or with a friend.

p.s. Memorize with a friend: recite together, share your memorizing tips, talk about your insights, and encourage each other!


Parallel phrases

Parallelism is common in Biblical literature; phrases are contrasted, repeated or expanded. Mary's Song of Praise is filled with parallelism.

e.g. verse 50 'from generation to generation.' verse 55 'to his offspring forever.'

Make a list of parallel words and phrases and figure out how to differentiate them in their context. Use your tool box - draw pictures, ask questions etc.

Putting the pieces together



- 1. Make an outline of the passage. Include boxes, bullet points, connecting words, key words and, if you like, verse numbers.
- 2. Fill in as many words as you can remember.
- 3. Then, look at the passage and fill in the blank spaces. Use your tools to help you remember the missing words: draw pictures, write out questions, find parallel words and make connections.

Each time you puzzle through the missing pieces, your memory improves. One day you will write out the whole passage without any help. *Congratulations, you did it!*
